
We think that our new artwork really sets the tone of Ellesmere being a reading school—what do you think?

A beautifully illustrated book about the bond between a boy and a bear.



Poetry Prompts by Joseph Coelho


We were over the moon to have Joseph come and visit us in October—what a treat to hear poetry being performed live!


Maisy, Charley and the Wobbly Tooth by Lucy Cousins

'A mouse took a stroll through the deep dark wood.'


Follow the mouse an his walk through the wood as he comes face to face with a fox, an owl, a snake and a hungry Gruffalo!




Students in Bradgate, Phoenix and Foxton class have been enjoying their reading for pleasure lessons. Have a look at what they've been reading this term.
















Spey recently received two surprises. The first: his ex-prisoner dad turning up unannounced, and the second: a mysterious package containing torn-up paper flowers.








Reading in school

We are delighted that we are now able to provide online access to books through ePlatform (eBooks, immersive books and audio books).


At home, students can to log on and borrow a digital book of their choosing using their phone, tablet / device.






New / Recent Releases
