
Our Summer Roving Reader is


Book recommendations

That's Nice, Love by Owen Gent




The Essential Guide to Retro Gaming: All the classic games you can play today by Joe Barnes

Each issue we recommend a classic children's book. This may be one you remember from your own childhood!




Funnybones by Janet and Allan Ahlberg



7 The right to read anywhere.





At home, students can to log on and borrow a digital book of their choosing using their phone, tablet / device.


Students now have access to a customised eLibrary brimming with amazing titles.


