This teamwork has truly meant that we have been able to offer the personalised curriculum that each of the students needs.










Post-16 - A Message from Sally, Head of Centre

Developing the Reading Shed and audio books



They have spent the school year in work rotations at Leicester Royal Infirmary in departments such as patient catering, portering and domestics. They have all grown as young adults, demonstrating that they are more independent, can try new things, meet new people and have the skills for paid employment. We are immensely proud of their achievements; their enthusiasm and the commitment they have shown and wish them every success in the future as they head towards the world of work.

In September we will welcome our next cohort of interns – not just at the hospital, but also in our second partner business, Hotel Brooklyn. We are looking forward to working with the interns in their supported internships in 2023/24.


Diversity Day
